### **RE: Campus Alberta Quality Council Sixteenth Report**

On behalf of the Campus Alberta Quality Council (CAQC), we have the pleasure of providing you with our Sixteenth Report for the period 1 April 2019 through 31 March 2025. This report highlights some of the main activities in which CAQC has been engaged during a five-year period that saw interruptions and changes to the work of Council due to the pandemic.

During this period, 117 degree proposals were referred to Council and Council made recommendations to the Minister on 97 programs/specializations. Each program was thoroughly examined and evaluated using the standards established and published by CAQC. In addition, Council conducted 18 Organizational Evaluations. This is an increased number of Organizational Evaluations when compared to previous periods. These processes support organizations in meeting CAQC's established and published standards for organizational readiness to implement and sustain high-quality degree programs in Alberta. CAQC's processes for evaluating and monitoring both programs and organizations ensures the integrity of the Albertan system and the competitive advantage of graduates provincially, nationally, and internationally.

On a per annum basis, Council has experienced a higher volume of program and organizational evaluations than traditionally received and Council continues to assess how processes can be improved to support this increasing volume. Initiatives included increased meetings to address the volume of proposals and, during the reporting period, Council met 38 times. We were pleased to increase our membership from 11 to 15 under approval from the Minister as an additional measure to increase capacity and look forward to recruiting for six (6) vacancies in 2025.

During the reporting period, Council's ongoing activities continued to promote and support effective quality assurance at both institutional and system levels. In 2023, Grant MacEwan University and Mount Royal University (Undergraduate Universities under the PSLA) were granted Quality Assurance Audit Status and Delegated Review Status following their second successful 2<sup>nd</sup> Comprehensive Organizational Evaluations and a proven record of internal quality assurance processes that meet Council's rigorous standards. With this status, Mount Royal and MacEwan Universities propose new programs under Delegated Evaluations resulting in reduced approval timelines. This also allows them to join, as observers, the four Comprehensive Academic and Research Universities during their third round of Quality Assurance Process Audits. During this period, Council's Monitoring

Standing Committee (MSC) reviewed and provided feedback with respect to the results of 67 Monitoring Reports from 22 Institutions as well as 62 institutional cyclical reviews for 107 programs from 12 resident and non-resident institutions, and continued to provide feedback to degree-granting institutions in Alberta, including Lethbridge Polytechnic, Northwestern Polytechnic, NAIT, SAIT, and Red Deer Polytechnic. Council has also begun work with Indigenous Post-Secondary Institutions, including Red Crow College, on their degree-granting proposals.

We are proud of our continuing work with Yukon University providing quality assurance services. Council's partnership with Yukon University provides a model for inter-jurisdictional quality assurance and has since expanded to include an agreement with the Northwest Territories and Aurora College as the College moves to offer its first degree-level programming and seeks to transition to a polytechnic with an anticipated Site Visit in 2025-2026.

Council has continued to work on revising the CAQC Handbook to ensure that the information and Standards for both Organizations and Programs are clearly and transparently provided to PSIs prior to application. Council believes that streamlining and clarifying expectations will ensure that degree-granting institutions are able to mount fulsome applications that will result in less delay in recommendations from Council to the Minister. Following feedback from post-secondary stakeholders in March 2025, Council will complete this work in Spring 2025.

CAQC is committed to the quality of the degree programming offered in Alberta and we are confident institutions within the system share that responsibility appropriately with Council and with the Ministry. We would like to acknowledge the excellent work of Council members, the Director, Manager, other members who comprise the highly skilled and professional Secretariat. We also thank the Ministry for on-going support and confidence in our work.

## CAQC Mandate

The Campus Alberta Quality Council, CAQC, is an arms length quality assurance agency that works to ensure that degree programs offered in Alberta are of a high quality in alignment with the pan-Canadian Ministerial Statement on Quality Assurance of Degree Education and the Canadian Degree Qualifications Framework. CAQC also acts as the quality assurance board for the Yukon and Northwest Territories.

Established under the Post-Secondary Learning Act (Section 108) to provide advice and recommendations to the Minister of Advanced Education, CAQC has the following Powers and Duties (per Section 109 of the PSLA):

- 109 (1) The Campus Alberta Quality Council may make rules governing the calling of its meetings, the procedure to be used at its meetings, the conduct of business at its meetings, reporting and any other matters as required.
- (2) The Campus Alberta Quality Council may inquire into and review any matter relating to a proposal to offer a program of study leading to the granting of a degree other than a degree in divinity.
- (3) Without restricting the generality of subsection (2), the Campus Alberta Quality Council may consider the capacity of a post-secondary institution to deliver and sustain a high-quality program in keeping with national and international standards.
- (4) The Campus Alberta Quality Council may exercise the powers and shall perform the duties and functions prescribed in the regulations.

Council is charged with the quality review of all degree programs proposed by:

- resident public institutions;
- resident private institutions, both for-profit and non-profit;
- non-resident – out-of-province – public institutions; and
- non-resident – out-of-province – private institutions, both for-profit and non-profit.

In fulfillment of its mandate, the Council:

- Reviews applications for degrees, undergraduate and graduate, referred by the Minister to determine if the applicant institution and proposed degree program meet the standards and conditions established (*Program of Study Regulation*);
- Establishes **minimum** standards and conditions for institutions and for degree programs in order to carry out its functions under the Regulation (*Program of Study Regulation*);
- Undertakes Organizational Evaluations of institutions seeking to offer degrees for the first time in Alberta;
- Monitors approved degree programs, including those delivered off-site;
- Conducts Comprehensive Evaluations of the organizational and program quality of degree granting institutions;
- Makes recommendations to the Minister based on an Organizational Evaluation of the institution and/or a Program Evaluation of the quality of a proposed or monitored degree program to ensure quality.

## CAQC Principles

Council undertook an evaluation and re-drafting of the CAQC Handbook during the reporting period. This work will be completed in 2025. In this process, Council has adopted new Core and Operating Principles that reflect the mandate of Council.

### CORE PRINCIPLES

1. The quality of the Student Experience is at the core of Council's activities as it assesses proposed degree programs and monitors the quality of existing degree programs.
2. Council's standards are appropriate to the nature and degree level of programs and are comparable to national and international standards. Council encourages innovation and creativity in degree programming when there is a demonstrated benefit to learners.
3. Council recognizes that the primary responsibility for academic and institutional quality assurance rests with degree granting institutions themselves.
4. Council respects the foundational role of academic freedom in the provision of high-quality degree programs.
5. Council regards scholarly activity as foundational in the provision of high-quality degree programs, recognizing that the nature of scholarship and disciplines may differ amongst different institutions and within individual institutions.
6. Peer review is an essential component of all of Council's evaluation processes.
7. Consultation with stakeholders is an integral part of degree program development, appraisal, and monitoring.
8. Council exhibits and promotes appreciation of institutional diversity and respect for institutional autonomy.
9. Council promotes institutional initiatives relating to Indigenization, inclusion, equity, diversity, accessibility, and citizenship to enrich the quality of degree programs and the student experience.

### OPERATING PRINCIPLES

10. Council exhibits and promotes collegiality, equity, openness, transparency, and efficiency in all its practices and policies.
11. As fully as possible, Council applies iterative processes involving clarification, education, guidance, persuasion, and negotiation in discussions with institutions in order to promote mutual understanding and high-quality degree programs.
12. Members and peer reviewers act in ways that build trust in Council's processes and decisions.
13. Members and peer reviewers act respectfully, autonomously, in accordance with ethical standards, and abide by Council's code of conduct – which includes provisions on conflicts of interest.
14. Council is committed to the quality assurance review of its own activities and to sharing effective practices in degree program quality assessment.

## Activities of Council

The Activities of Council continued throughout the pandemic and in response to the 2019-2022 CAQC Action Plan. As necessitated, Council moved to an increased number of online meetings to ensure the work of Council continued. Council also engaged in online site visits to facilitate Organizational Evaluations and Program Evaluations continued uninterrupted.

Due to the volume of proposals and facilitated by the ability to meet online, Council increased its online meetings during the reporting period and held, on average, six meetings per year (an increase from the previous reporting period). Council normally meets in person at a host institution at least twice per year in addition to regular online meetings. Hosting Council Meetings provides Council with insight into the strategic vision and operation of Albertan Post-Secondary Institutions, including their programs, quality assurance processes, and current and future plans, while enhancing communication within the Albertan post-secondary system. During the Reporting Period, Council focused on the following activities:

- redrafting of the CAQC Handbook into two Handbooks, for Organizations and Programs, that will streamline approval and monitoring processes while ensuring the ongoing high-quality of degrees offered in Alberta;
- conducting program proposal evaluations and making recommendations to the Minister on applications from post-secondary institutions to offer new degree programs;
- monitoring approved degree programs to ensure their compliance with Council's conditions and quality standards;



- refining and streamlining Council’s documentation, procedures, and assessment practices with respect to program proposals and monitoring activities;
- working with post-secondary institutions to assist them in improving the quality of new proposed degree programs;
- providing feedback to institutions on the results of their program cyclical reviews;
- offering advice to institutions on Council’s quality standards and review and monitoring processes;
- working in partnership with the Comprehensive Academic and Research Institutions (CARIs) on the third quality assurance audit (scheduled for 2025);
- reviewing applications for Quality Assurance Audit status (granted to Mount Royal University and Grant MacEwan University);
- continuing to respond to the outcomes of the Agencies, Boards and Commission’s (ABC) review of Council and implementing the recommendations from that review;
- working with the Ministry on initiatives related to Council’s mandate; and
- communicating the role of Council to stakeholders within the province and strengthening communication networks with other provincial quality assurance agencies and the public.

## Action Plan 2019-2022

As required by the Public Agencies Governance Framework, all advisory councils accountable to the Minister are expected to have an action plan identifying priorities to be undertaken during a three-year planning cycle in order to fulfill their mandates. To align its work with this expectation and to implement the recommendations from the ABC review of CAQC, Council adopted its Action Plan at the October 2019 meeting. The plan outlines three goals, seven priority and eight continuing operations initiatives. As of 31 March 2023, the implementation status of CAQC’s priority and continuing operations initiatives was as follows:

**Goal 1: Council will carry out high quality, efficient, and evidence-based reviews of new degree program proposals.**

## Future Initiatives

As required by the Public Agencies Governance Framework, all advisory councils accountable to the Minister are expected to have an action plan identifying priorities to be undertaken during a three-year planning cycle in order to fulfill their mandates. In consideration for the 2025-2028 Action Plan, Council is engaged in the following initiatives:

1. **Implementation of the revised CAQC Handbook** and assessing the impact on program approval processes.
2. **Engagement in the cyclical Government of Alberta Review of Agencies, Boards, and Commissions**
3. **Developing Service Standards** for CAQC-led evaluations and monitoring cycles.
4. **Redevelopment of templates and guides** for organizational evaluations, program evaluations, and program and organizational monitoring to ensure high-quality degree standards are met or exceeded while ensuring streamlining of processes and timelines.
5. **Refining processes for Quality Assurance Process Audits** and planning the fourth round to include MRU and MacEwan and combining QAPA with former DNPAS to streamline application to the renamed Delegated Review Status.
6. **Development of specific Scholarly Activity Reporting Requirements** for Polytechnic Institutes and Comprehensive Community Colleges offering degrees to ensure both alignment with the Canadian Degree Qualifications Framework and institutional mandates.
7. **Developing and adopting criteria for the assessment of private institutions and Private Career Colleges intending to offer degree programs.**

## Evaluations and Recommendations

Council's Principles highlight the importance of peer evaluations to assess and monitor the quality of degrees in Alberta while progressively moving responsibility for quality to the institutions offering degrees:

- Principle 1: The Quality of the Student Experience is at the core of Council's activities as it assesses proposed degree programs and monitors the quality of existing degree programs.
- Principle 2: Council's standards are appropriate to the nature and degree level of programs and are comparable to national and international standards. Council encourages innovation and creativity in degree programming when there is a demonstrated benefit to learners.
- Principle 3: Council recognizes that the primary responsibility for academic and institutional quality assurance rests with degree granting institutions themselves.
- Principles 6: Peer review is an essential component of all of Council's evaluation processes.

These principles provide assurances to Albertans regarding the quality of degree-level programming in the province. At each stage, teams of carefully selected evaluators made of up senior academics and/or academic administrators from institutions offering approved degree programs in Alberta or elsewhere in Canada. These teams are responsible for evaluating organizations and programs for alignment with the standards set by Council.

## Applications Referred to Council and Council Recommendations

Since 1 April 2019, **117 degree** programs/specializations/changes have been referred to Council (one withdrawn by the Institution during the Organizational Evaluation which is in progress). Council has made recommendations to the Minister on **97 programs/specializations, 34 of which were subject to an Expedited Review by PRSC acting on behalf of Council and 30 of which were subject to Delegated Program Review by the Institutions.** Upon recommendations from Council, the Minister approved all but one of these programs.

Maximizing the efficiency of review processes is a high priority for Council. With the addition of Mount Royal University and MacEwan University to the Delegated Review Status (formerly referred to as DNPAS), Council has experienced an increase in proposals under this category (averaging 145 days from submission to approval, primarily in System Coordination Review prior to referral to Council).

As more institutions have been approved to grant degrees, Council has also seen an increase in Expedited Review requests when eligibility requirements are met. With few exceptions, the review process is shorter for Expedited Reviews (averaging 230 Net Working Days from initial submission to the Ministry, through referral to Council, evaluation by PRSC, and approval by the Minister of Advanced Education) than for Standard Program Evaluations (averaging 401 Net Working Days) as Council works with each Institution to ensure quality.



Program submissions that initiate an Organizational Evaluation average 417-596 Net Working Days. From 2019-2025, Council has worked with 13 Post-Secondary Institutions requiring Organizational Evaluations with 7 successfully completing their Organizational Evaluation and subsequent Program Evaluations and 5 in progress. Though the proportion of review type under Council's consideration varies annually, Council has seen a sharp increase in the number of proposals from institutions new to degree-granting requiring an Organizational Evaluation and Standard Program Evaluation.

To fulfill Council's mandate of ensuring the high-quality of degree programs offered in Alberta, and to further ensure that Campus Alberta and the degrees offered within the Campus Alberta system are recognized nationally and internationally, Council will continue to engage with similar bodies in other jurisdictions to monitor, evaluate, and streamline its processes within the Alberta context.

## Membership of Council

Council's Membership increased from 11 to 15 members appointed by the Minister. Over the reporting period, Dr. Gurston Dacks, Dr. Gordon Nixon, and Dr. Gayla Rogers shared the role of Co-Chairs of the Council. Dr. Dacks term with Council ended June 2023. See Appendices 1a and 1b for details of Council's Membership during the reporting period.

## CAQC Secretariat

The CAQC Secretariat, provided by the Ministry of Advanced Education, assists the Co-Chairs and Council in their activities by providing expert advice on matters of policy and procedure, organizing all Council and subcommittee meetings, helping to set meeting agendas and preparing background documentation, drafting correspondence, drafting publications, providing advice on monitoring and program evaluation, helping to orient new members, and performing environmental scanning. Secretariat staff provide direct support and guidance to the Program Review Standing Committee and the Monitoring Standing Committee. As well, the Secretariat coordinates all aspects of Council's external evaluation teams and the Secretariat's Manager serves as an advisory member on the teams to provide advice and ensure consistency across reviews.

The Secretariat also provides information and advice in response to inquiries from various agencies, current and prospective applicants, and members of the public about matters related to evaluation of new degree programs and monitoring of degree programs. It also maintains the Council's website and SharePoint sites.

He is the Cenovus Energy Endowed Chair in Environmental Engineering and also the Deputy Director of Future Energy Systems. Dr. Kumar has served on several expert panels including the European Commission, NSF (USA), the House of Commons and the Senate of Canada for his expertise on energy issues. He is a Fellow of the Canadian Academy of Engineering and was listed by Reuters in the "The Reuters Hot List," a list of the world's top climate scientists according to how influential they are.
